Thoughts For The Month

Gershwin's "Porgy and Bell" - "Summertime and the living is easy. Fish are jumpin' and the cotton is high." Wasn't this summer a "WOW"! Grumbles, whines or whoopee! Sunshine—no thoughts the same but actually the earth is the Lord's, not a super market to satisfy our desires. God's turned the thermostat again about this time every year but sometimes difficult to tell when our world (and how we treat it) is so mixed up everywhere—drought where it shouldn't be, water overflowing rivers elsewhere, fires, earthquakes, tornadoes, monsoons, etc. You name it, it's happening somewhere if we take time to notice and pay attention. Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." - John 14:27.

Does your life seem increasingly busy? On board trains, busses, cars, etc., everyone is talking on cell phones the size of a playing card. When we call a friend on the telephone we often get the answering machine. Should our lives be like this, constant rushing thither and yon? Seemingly never a quiet moment – always listening to or watching some electronic device? Watch the honey bee with his ceaseless labor within a hotbed of activity. A single worker bee makes one twelfth of a teaspoon of honey in her lifetime and a good hive will produce 50 to 60 pounds of honey to survive the winter. The job never ends but even they find a spot on the comb to rest, do absolutely nothing for awhile and, you know, it doesn't hurt the hive at all. How about your life? Know ours of late has created more stress and anxiety because of, at our age, never-ending tasks that are everywhere. Free weeds anyone? Ours and family members medical problems every week and unfortunately, the constant loss of friends to one illness or another. As Ziggy's cartoon says, "Sometimes I think life is one big test...and I'm in the wrong classroom." We must follow the example of the honey bee and find moments to just stop to find some peace for our soul. After all, Jesus did when he went up the mountain to pray – to create time and space for God to refresh his spirit. If Jesus needed time, surely, we also. The weeds will still be out there tomorrow!

Read this interesting summation about President Obama's beer summit at the White House last week. "Tell me what kind of beer a man drinks, and I'll tell you who he is. A Sierra Nevada? Probably lives in a blue state and drives a foreign car – maybe even a Prius. A Bud Light? A red stater, likes football, probably gets where he's going in a Chevy flatbed." It's all quite reductionist, this classification by beer choice, but it was certainly on the participants at President Obama's beer summit. Professor Henry Louis Gates originally asked for a Red Stripe from Jamaica (suggesting a certain worldliness and loyalty to people of color), but then switched to a more raceneutral choice, the Boston area favorite Sam Adams light. Sgt. James Crowley, a thinking man's cop, selected Bloe Moon, a fruity wheat beer brewed in Toronto that's often served with a slice of orange. The message: I'm no redneck. Obama went with Bud Light to show what a regular guy he is, his upcoming vacation in Martha's Vineyard notwithstanding.

We Americans like to think we're not a class-based society, but beer is just one of the social signifiers that tip off where we fit in the grand scheme of race, education, politics, and wealth. A Subaru says one thing about its driver, a Dodge Ram says another. Working folk get their caffeine fix at Dunkin Donuts, while the highly educated queue up for a venti Sumatra at Starbucks. Arugula or iceberg? A Mac or PC? Target or Bloomingdales? Even when a copy ops for the fancy foreign beer and the President picks the every man's suds, our choices betray how we'd prefer to be perceived. In the land of plenty, you are what you consume. Anyone you know fit in? Too many ifs, ands and so what's? All our cultures share human needs that bring us together. Because we share a common world, we also share a common destiny to recognize ourselves in all people. We must learn to create and live in a world in which people of all cultures are treated with respect. Remember, "in the sands of time, our human footprints are remarkably the same, differing only by size and depth not by color, age or gender." Good idea every so often to re-read Shel Silverstein's "No Difference".

Small as a peanut, big as a giant, we're all the same size when we turn off the light. Rich as a sultan, poor as a mite, we're all worth the same when we turn off the light. Red, black or orange, yellow or white, we all look the same when we turn off the light. So maybe the way to make everything right is for God to just reach out and turn off the light!

'Nuf heavy, heavy! He's already turned down the thermostat. Time to sweep out summer and reduce your carbon footprint. Recycling all of your home's waste newspaper print, cardboard, glass and metal can reduce emissions an additional 850# a year. If your car gets 10 mpg more than the old one, CO3 emissions are reduced by 2,500# a year. Clean your counter tops, cupboards and walls, dip a cloth in warm water, add a little dish soap and baking soda. Try catalog shopping. (Here I am! And share the catalogs with many.) You'll save energy by not driving and reduce stress by avoiding the crowded malls. No worry about parking space. If you must go, take the bus. Skip wrapping paper. Use leftover fabric, lightweight wallpaper and the Sunday comics to wrap gifts. I often use a kitchen towel or doily depending upon who's receiving it and why – time to downsize. Replace your charcoal grill with an electric one. They generate far fewer air pollutants than burning charcoal or even propane gas.

Passing thoughts for any day — make up your mind but don't forget how to turn it around. Forbidden fruit makes a bad jam. Intelligence is like a river; the deeper it is, the less noise it makes. We would have better kids today if they had to chop wood to keep T.V., their iPods, blackberries, etc., working.

Fall is coming. Get outside to see that big orange moon, walk 'midst the crackling, fallen leaves, and give your silent blessings for all you see, have and feel.

Church of the Beloved

Have you ever wondered why Church of the Beloved and Ryan Marsh Are listed as Deployed staff of Bethesda Lutheran Church?

& be blessed by Ryan and several of Beloved's musicians' for a unique style of worship, Gospel proclamation & music that is reaching people far off from God in a new and creative way.

History of Church of the Beloved's beginning:

SEP 7 2006 a group of five ELCA churches (calling themselves the emergent Mission Prayer Team or eMPT), including Bethesda Lutheran Church, began meeting to pray about what they could do to engage 'missing generations' who were scarce within their congregations. They had tried many things in the past, but were now convinced that the Spirit of God was calling them to find leaders who were indigenous to these 'missing generations' and benevolently support them in a new mission without expecting any measurable benefit to their own churches. They invited Ryan Marsh, who was currently working at Church of the Apostles, to consult and pray with them. The longer he prayed with them the more he wondered, "Is it me, God?" After a process of discernment, everyone agreed Ryan was going to move back to his home town of Edmonds to help nurture a new community of faith grown from the ground up. He started by gathering a core group of dreamers already living in and around that neighborhood. Each of the fourteen had similar stories of growing up in the church, becoming disenchanted and inactive in the church, but still very active in faith and hope for the church. They met on Thursday nights to share a meal, stories, fears and hopes for starting a community of faith, realizing along the way that they were already were church... an imperfect, fumbling into God's grace, Church. Then, on Ash Wednesday 2007, they let the closed core group die in order to give birth to an open community called Church of the Beloved.
