Greetings Easter people in the name of the Risen Christ,

"Alleluia! Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

One of my favorite Easter Hymns and one which we sing here at Bethesda on Easter morning, is "Jesus Christ is Risen Today". The text comes from an old carol of the 14th Century. On Easter Sunday as we belted out the Alleluia's we heard the sounds of the many instruments that accompanied Lee as he played the organ with all the stops pulled out. What a glorious sound of celebration of the Risen Christ this was and is each year.

This song is written is such a way that it reminds us of something that has happened in the past and as we remember it in that way it also moves us to understand that it is happening again right now in the present, in this time and place. So on Easter Sunday we sang, "Jesus Christ is risen today, our triumphant holy day." It is not that we pretend that every Easter Jesus rises again, because we still sing "today." We do not sing, "Jesus Christ was raised almost 2000 years ago." The past is never just the past because we make it our own now, today, right here in Mountlake Terrace, in May of 2011.

When we gather at the table on Sunday mornings and receive the 'Lord's Supper", we remember the night in which Jesus was betrayed, and we are reminded that this is not a historical reenactment of the Last Supper. It is about us hearing Jesus saying to each of us personally, "This is my body; this is my blood." This too is the past breaking into and becoming the present for us today.

We are indeed Easter People! So we sing boldly and with gusto, "Jesus Christ is Risen Today," and the past is no longer just a prologue, but the present. God is indeed breaking into our world and wants to break into our lives and is indeed up to something here at Bethesda Lutheran Church in Mountlake Terrace! Will we dare to live in God's amazing grace? Will we dare to expect God to show in surprising and new ways?

What if we imagined the determining of the time of our death as a dialogue between us and God? What might it be like to be able either to ask God for our death or to ask God for more life? Is there a possibility that, like Jonah, we could influence God's decisions? Is it possible that God might be flexible

Could this help us surrender if death came sooner than we hoped for? Could this help us carry on if life lasted longer than we wished?

I am grateful for my family members and all the special people God has placed in my path. How very blessed I am!



Thoughts For The Month

"Spring has sprung, the grass has riz—I wonder where the flowers iz!" So goes that ancient whatever of many years. More truth than fiction these last few months for all of us, near and far. If I didn't know better I'd vouch for aliens far above us sprinkling germs, catastrophes, crummy weather, wars, etc., over our world. But it isn't truly our world, is it? It's God's world for us and it's ugly how we're wrecking it. Scott Peck's best selling book, "The Road Less Traveled", begins with an unwelcome truth—"Life is difficult!" Wouldn't we like to believe that everything will always be ok, that war or lifechanging loss or serious illness will never touch us? Often one will hear, "Well, that's God's plan for us", our ideas of serving God. But the Easter story always reminds us, walking the road of obedience to God does not guarantee an easy or pleasant journey at all times. Truly the road of discipleship is a road of sacrificial love given away for the good of others. It's not necessarily the one projected in many books and movies as a warm and fuzzy (transitory) emotion. The love to which God calls us is steady and enduring, one surviving the tests of our years to live faithfully when we really don't want to do what God asks. Sometimes doing what love asks is tough, possibly a sacrifice that doesn't feel good at all. But that doesn't mean we can't or wont do it. Jesus showed us that. Still wondering where those "flowers iz"? Thought for the day: God brings abundant fruit from the seeds of caring we plant, sown with a purpose. Winston Churchill once said, "We make a living by what we get. We make a life by what we give." What have you given to life lately—a smile, laughter, a hug? Have you paid someone a compliment lately, telling a friend how special he or she is? We received a very heart warming note a week ago, coming at a very "down" time with all these medical problems we can't seem to get rid of. Yes, we've been grumbling, whining, grouching, etc., for some time. Bless you and thank you, dear Ruby, for opening our eyes and hearts to the sunshine. She knew we were hurting and went out her way to be kind. Have you been willing to share your time and your life for someone who's hurting? People should be cherished. When we pass up that opportunity, we pass up life. Isn't giving to people what life is all about? Karen Armstrong's book "Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life" asks "you might think you're a compassionate person: maybe you give time and money to charity, routinely make sacrifices for the well-being of your family and friends and try to avoid unfairly judging others. But when asked to send kind thoughts and follow up with acts of friendship, compassion, joy and fair-mindedness to your enemies, you may realize you're as self-centered as anyone else in our "me first" modern world." Her key to making the world more caring and more whole is found in religion. Whoa! Which also happens to contribute to too many of the world's divisions. Using the universality of the Golden Rule following its course from Confucius and the Buddha to modern day monotheism to create a program thought provoking is far beyond her book for spreading compassion. "We are to do unto others as we would have them do unto us and loving our neighbors as ourselves." But how often do we practice it? She

writes that the Golden Rule is not just an ideal but a 21st century necessity. The global economy is so interconnected that everyone is a neighbor. National boundaries are meaningless essentially, as war affects financial markets around the world and one group's suffering is likely to provoke vengeance and more harm. But not always when one thinks of the suffering in Japan or by tornadoes in our own country. Armstrong asks us to listen. To make space for the other in their minds and speech, using Socratic compassionate discourse rather than speech trying to persuade others to agree with us. Seemingly we don't do enough of this today—it is not enough for us to seek the truth; we also want to defeat and even humiliate our opponents. Armstrong lays out a pluralistic, and ultimately, secular way to spread compassion that's easy to believe in. But the challenge—anyone actually following it?

Whoosh—'nuf heavy, heavy! May, it's May, the merry month of May! (Ah Camelot) A thinking month always for us besides the usual tasks of gardening, weeds, etc., it's a "wow" with so many family birthdays, graduations, weddings and the remembering day—Cinco De Mayo (5th), Mother's Day (8th), Law Enforcement Memorial Day (15th), Armed Forces Day (21st), and Memorial Day (30th) - all strong reminders that those we honor are more than simply names. They were living people who loved and were loved—and are still loved.

Of course, there is always spring house cleaning, no matter what mood you're in or what needs to be done! Did your mom have special days to clean—during those days when there were less "electric items" to help? Did you have brothers or sisters to help? What was your job? Still do it? Who likes to "do windows"? You know to clean your pipes, put 3 Alka Seltzer down the kitchen sink, followed by a cup of white vinegar. Leave for a few minutes, then run hot water. "Nuf hand work—have a smile or two. It's not whether you win or lose, but how you place the blame. A fool and his money can throw one heck of a party. Good friends are like starts—you don't always see them, but you know they are always there. Life isn't about waiting for the storms to pass—it's about learning to dance with the rain. New Committee

A new committee was formed to look at what can be done to save money in the church and cut down on the expenses and make improvements. The committee members are Dena Lee, Joy Halladay, Michael and Caryl Klingensmith, Cliff Pearson, and Penny Thedens.

At our first meeting we looked at the Waste Management bills. These bills were the first concern for use as they were just outrageous. Joy called the Waste Management department and along with Mickey talked to Stephen Jones about the problem.

1. We will clean up your tote situation and get you new totes.

- 2. Make sure the color coordination is good and get you EXTRA totes for recycling.
- 3. In addition, if you go onto a WEEKLY recycle route, there is no extra charge for that.

We now have 5 new colored totes of 2-RECYCLE containers, 1-SW container, 2-Yard Waste/Food Waste. The quote from Steven at Waste Management looks like \$99 against \$400 and every week pickup. We did a follow up to review with Waste Management our new bill and it has been lowered down to what we should be paying \$184.00 for a two month bill, that's \$92.00 a month. Do to the

help of the congregation and all the work in the kitchen we have made a big step in the right direction.

Also Joann is collecting the aluminum cans and selling them to a recycler and putting the money to funds that are needed. Pull tab from cans are being collected to raise money and Joy Halladay is looking at plastic bottle caps. All this good work is paying off.

More labeling on totes and inside garbage cans are coming to make things easier for everyone to do their part.
