Thoughts For The Month

Fyodor Dostoevsky has written "Love all God's creation. Love all God's animals. Love the plants. Love each separate thing." Bethesda is trying! Special thanks and hugs to all the ones who worked so hard and long for our Earth Day—Care of Creation and Plant Sale. How green are we? Earth keeping is a term used by many people of faith describing and trying to show us the nature of our responsibility to care for creation. "It springs from our wonder, awe and gratitude for God's wisdom, creativity and blessings filling our natural world. It also grows out of our dismay and concern for the degradations and "groaning" of God's good creation. Faithful earth keeping involves extending the justice, peace, reconciliation, hope and love of Christ to all creation." Rachel Carson's Silent Spring book was a strong 'look what you're doing to the world you live in' and launched the modern environmental movement in 1962. Another huge leap forward was the beginning of Earth Day in 1970. Many people began to be very concerned abut the degradation of the planet and realized caring for the earth also deepens our relationship with God and with one another, making our faith more alive and relevant, in and to a broken world. Psalm 8:3-4, 6a: "When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars that you have established; what are human beings that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them? (yet)...You have given them dominion over the works of your hands." Bishop Hanson's commentary, "We cannot escape the interconnectedness of the earth's fabric of life. Creation is the matrix of all our activities, both as human beings and as Christ's church. God gives us and all creatures life through the water, air, food, and all the other gifts that come to us from the earth. Everything we do depends on these gifts, and has some kind of impact upon them. If these are treated with contempt and abused, people, animals, and plants suffer together. If they are graciously received and cherished, people will flourish with the rest of creation. We cannot love God or our human neighbor without caring for creation. The question is not whether the church (that's us!) will engage what our society calls the environment but how!" He also asks the question, "What is your hopeful vision, as a child of God, for how many humans should live on the earth in connection with the rest of ation?" Answer? What would you say to God, in a letter to express your appreciation for or even your questions about the natural world? What, specifically, would you thank God for? What would you express sorrow about? What would you tell God that you will do, to help heal creation? I'm sure God, aware of the mess we're making and too many continuing, will appreciate a 'pat on the back'. Martin Luther writes, "God wants to be praised for nourishing and cherishing, for God cherishes all creatures. God is not only the creator, but is also the sustainer and nourisher." No easy tasks but our Saturday sale was a public start.

What do we mean when we say GREEN? Environmental health for people and the planet. Social and economic justice. Corporate responsibility. Thriving local communities. Green economy and green jobs. A world where everyone has what they need. We seek a world free of war and the threat of war.

World Ocean Day is June 8, 2012. Helping to save the ocean doesn't have to be a daunting job. Even small actions add up. A few simple things: evaluate your needs—if you're going to eat seafood, make sure it is sustainable. Choose environmentally friendly products—if your stove or restaurant does not carry them, ask them to. (Whoops, there go the French fries!) Recycle plastic products and join something in your area doing a clean-up. Raise awareness-educate your family and friends about the importance of our oceans. Summer's coming—swimming, picnicking, whatever by the water—pick up after yourselves. One element can influence another. A spark of green can lead to a shower of green over time. A shared purpose builds and grows, i.e., Lions Clubs in Italy drew up a plan to save the Mediterranean in accordance with United Nations guidelines. Lectures and seminars on safeguarding the sea from pollution and fund raising was held to raise money for such as three 250-meter barriers, made from rock, were submerged in the sea to prevent erosion along the famous white coast. Restaurants, homes and schools in Thailand routinely and unthinkingly dump cooking grease in waterways, resulting in clogged pipes, unsightly conditions and unsafe water. Local Lions clubs devised a simple, inexpensive method to trap the grease, collect it in a bin and then buried near trees as fertilizer or dried in the sun to become charcoal. Wonder what's done in our area. "Living green" really can help save our planet but there will always be disbelievers. Individuals who want a better planet practice conservation, reuse and recycle. Do we need to figure out a way to always blame what's done already on past generations or start doing more ourselves? If you get an idea, no matter how small, let's pass it on. You're making a difference one way or another. For years, we at Bethesda (and other friends) collect used greeting cards to send to Medical Lake or make post cards for veterans to use. Stan mailed 48# last shipment. Any holiday or greetings—bring to church or Krahn's. Save your used stamps for Maxine, our "stamp lady". Leave 1/4" around edge. They have been mailed to a couple of mission churches to sell for their work. Joan Minnis is our "save aluminum cans lady" - smash and sell proceeds for our youth group. Cyndi Wesley collects the can tabs for the kidney foundation. Our next door senior house ladies collect soup labels and that special piece on food boxes. Sorry, I'm not as knowledgeable about that so call or visit them. Also, they can use knitting and crochet thread for the sharing things they make. All these are starts, very easily part of your days to help someone.

June and Father's Day! Dear Dad will probably be very happy you're getting rid of some stuff (and not in the garbage). Evening time, take him outside, look up at a clear night sky together and give him a big hug and tell him you love him. How very much we do need and love them! Remember our stewardship of all creation is never needed more poignant and urgent than today. Start doing something.
