Pastor Malcolm's thoughts for February

On Sunday February 23rd we will begin our 9th year together as the people of God listening to God and engaging with what God is already doing here and calling us into at this mission outpost we call Bethesda Lutheran Church in Mountlake Terrace Washington, in the 98043 Zip Code

So we began some 8 years ago and continue to spend our time together as disciples, (*life long learners*) and as apostles, (*sent ones*), of Jesus Christ, through our lens of being Lutheran, proclaiming the Gospel for the sake of our world here in the 98043 Zip Code and beyond.

Together we continue to spend time wondering, with God, who we have been called to be and what we are called to do for the sake others and for the sake of our world. We and the very spirited Strategic Planning Team for Mission have done this by listening and wondering what God is up to here in our neighborhood in this and at this place. Those of us, who are still new, in the sixty plus years of ministry at this mission center, appreciate all who have gone before us. We are to be his hands and feet, God's listening ears and compassionate heart with mouths that give freely and generously love and grace and not judgment and condemnation. We are people who give generously through our lives, our space, our time, our gifts and our acts of both listening and speaking.

The following was sent to Pr. Malcolm Brown on January 17, 2014.

“Again our thanks to you and your congregation for your continuing support Concern For Neighbors Food Bank in Mountlake Terrace. Your monetary donations we received during 2013 were approximately \$1,670 and always aid us in purchasing food and providing some financial assistance to our clients that are in need.”

“Hunger is still prevalent in our area, in our state and across the country. However, we have seen some reduction in our client numbers from 160 to 180 per week to about 150-170 clients per week. Hopefully this is a sign that the economy is starting to turn around but we have heard from some clients that they are returning to the food bank because of the recent cutbacks in food stamps. We will just have to see if this trend continues. Even though our client numbers are going down, our financial assistance funds are depleted by the end of the first or second week or each month.”

“Again our thanks from the Board of Directors, all our volunteers and clients in helping us continue to serve our community. We wish you all a very healthy and prosperous 2014.”

9 “verses” that aren’t in the Bible

Several popular sayings can put biblical literacy to the test. For example, the phrases below aren’t in Scripture — although some come pretty close:

- “Money is the root of evil.” (According to 1 Timothy 6:10, “the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil.”)
- “Cleanliness is next to godliness.” (The closest teaching to this might be in James 4:8.)
- “God helps those who help themselves.” (This proverb originated in ancient Greece, not in Scripture.)
- “God moves in mysterious ways.” (A verse kind of like this is Isaiah 55:8.)
- “Spare the rod, spoil the child.” (British poet Samuel Butler coined this phrase, which could be a paraphrase of Proverbs 13:24.)
- “This, too, shall pass.” (This occurs nowhere in the Bible but has been linked, incorrectly, to King Solomon.)
- “Love the sinner, hate the sin.” (St. Augustine originally came up with a version of this phrase.)
- “Charity begins at home.” (British theologian John Wycliffe is credited with this saying.)
- “God will never give you more than you can bear.” (This seems to be a misinterpretation of 1 Corinthians 10:13.)
